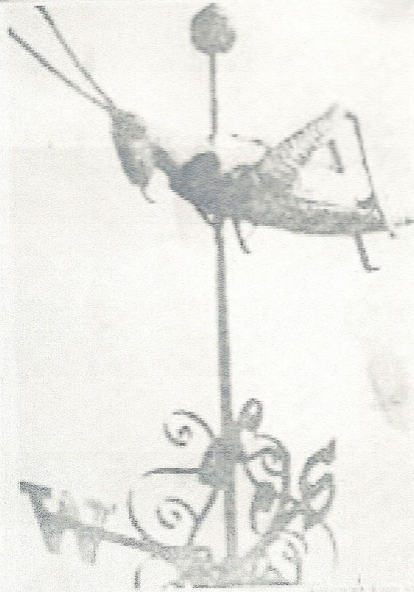
New ripoff

Police in Norton, Mass., are keeping their eyes open for an unusual thief — one who flies over houses in a helicopter and lassoes weathervanes.

Two Norton homeowners and another from Raynham, Mass., recently reported their valuable weathervanes missing. But it wasn't until Mrs. Marsha Brumell of Rehoboth, Mass., heard a noise outside her house "and saw a helicopter with a rope hanging out of it" that police got a lead.

"The helicopter was above our barn, trying to steal our weathervane," she said. — UPI 1972

Historic Grasshopper
Kidnaped by Copter?

BOSTON — (AP) — Robbers who stole an 80-pound copper grasshopper weathervane that for 232 years sat atop Boston's historic Faneuil Hall probably used a helicopter, police said.

Police and city officials said the missing four-foot-long grasshopper, gilded with gold leaf, is priceless. An expert said it would probably sell for hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The superintendent of the old hall, located in the Haymarket Square area, discovered the grasshopper was missing when he went on the roof to raise the flag Friday. The last time he remembered noticing it was a month before, but several persons said they saw it around Christmas, police said.

Police Det. Paul R. Carroll discounted the possibility that the thieves could have climbed up inside or outside the building to take the grasshopper. He doubted that they could climb up to the top of the building's cupola, lift the heavy weather vane off its perch and climb down with the bulky piece.

The vane was hammered in 1742 by Deacon Shem

The Bear Went To Bank but Got Needled

COOKEVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) — A black bear found wandering in downtown Cookeville was captured in the community room of a local bank Friday after it put two coeds to flight and then lumbered up to a motel and banged on the door.

Lt. Fred White of the Cookeville Police Department said the 350-pound animal was first spotted shortly after midnight by two Tennessee Tech coeds walking down Broad Street.

"They ran for about a mile before they stopped at a restaurant and notified authorities," White said. The officer said the girls did not pause long enough to give their names.

After the call, officers in squad cars were dispatched to search for the bear. "It had crossed town and was banging on the door of White's Motor Lodge and had run off a large dog when we finally found it," White said.

City police and a state trooper hemmed the bear in with their patrol cars in front of the bank. The

bear broke through a plate glass door and lumbered around in the community room while police called the State Game and Fish Commission.

Mike Foster, the local G&F officer, finally tracked down a tranquilizer gun at the rabies control unit in nearby Smithville. Foster said the bear had "pretty well calmed down" by the time he arrived at the bank.

"We went into the room there with him and it sort of scared him," Foster said. "He rared up on this plate glass window and we shot him in the right fore-flank with a dart.

"It is supposed to take about two or three minutes for the drug on the dart to have any effect, but within about 45 seconds, he had collapsed."

"They will either send him to some zoo or carry him up to east Tennessee and release him," Foster said.

Foster said bears were not native to this east-central Tennessee area and neither he nor police had any idea where the animal came from.

SHAGGY BEAR STORIES: For years now bears have been behaving peculiarly in the U.S., often wandering into towns in a confused disoriented state. Some of these animals were rare types, much as the Himalayan bear in the accompanying news story from New Jersey, 1967. In fourteen separate incidents, 1966-74, the source of the animal remained undetermined. They had not escaped from zoos or circuses. Not one of these bear cases produce hairy monster or Sasquatch-type reports. Obviously witnesses knew very well they had seen a bear. Police and game authorities captured or killed the animals in each incident.

The question remains: Where did these poor lumbering mammals come from? Were they apported from some distant point by forces we do not understand?

Bears in national parks everywhere have turned neurotic in recent years. Several campers have been killed by the emotionally disturbed animals. Civilization, it seems, is crowding their natural habitats and is having the same effect on that it has on us.

STONE GIANTS

An Italian expedition claims to have discovered the source of an ancient legend about a giant race of man-monsters. Expedition leader Dr. Cino Boccazzi says his team has discovered a group of ancient stone statues on an uncharted mountain in the Tenere desert. Dr. Boccazzi says his expedition found the statues—each over twelve feet high—near the site of a dinosaur cemetery. The scientist says ten were still standing and another forty had fallen. Dr. Boccazzi

points out that the statues were found in the same general region where the legend originated. According to the ancient tale, a race of giants lived in the area, but they sinned by defying the gods, and were turned to stone. Scientists feel an ancient community may have originally constructed the giant statues in tribute to the gods. They speculate that a later race apparently stumbled upon the stone giants and dreamed up the legend as the only possible explanation for the huge stone objects.

At Least The Bear Was Real

Those magnificent men in those flying machines that always seem to elude corroboration, were at it again early today.

Residents of Wanaque, N. J., 25-3/10 miles from Times Square as the Saucer flies, reported seeing another of those "invasions from outer space."

The unidentified flying object was sighted over the adjoining reservoir shortly after midnight, within a hundred yards or so from the site where one was seen last Summer.

Nobody could describe precisely what he saw beyond the fact it was a "bright object." Bright enough, apparently, to have illuminated the scene at Ringwood, N. J., three miles away, where a resident saw a bear.

Police at Wanaque investigated the UFO perfunctorily. After all "flying saucers" are reported quite frequently. But the bear report got the full treatment.

After all, it was only last April that police and volunteer workers shot a Himalayan bear in that area. State game authorities called him a "mysterious intruder from an unknown source," at the time.

Could he have traveled on a flying saucer?
