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A Rational Approach to Psychic Attack by Persephone

One morning you wake up with a raspy feeling at the back of your throat and plugged sinuses, indicating the onset of a pesky head cold. You knock your coffee cup in the floor and it shatters as you pour the last of the pot in the cup. You glance outside and the lawn is withered and your pet chrysanthemums are sagging. But it is only when you put your panty hose on backwards and they run in six places that you begin to suspect you are under psychic attack.

One of the first things I do is to reenforce my defenses. An extra shot of vitamin C will help the cold, and orange juice is quicker than a fresh pot of coffee. 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Time and the Tarot by Linda Dice

Ed note (LF): This article was an entry in the Pagan Studies Contest).

One of the more difficult aspects of a tarot reading is to ascertain when the events depicted in the reading will come about. Fortunately, there is a relatively easy method of using the cards which will help considerably. After the cards have been shuffled, cut them in your usual way, restack them, then turn over the top card. This becomes your time card.

As with any other Tarot card, this will need interpretation, so you will need to use your intuition. But, as an example, to turn over a two of any suit (or even the High Priestess, whose number is two) may indicate two hours, two days, two weeks, two months, or even occasionally, two years. Each Tarot deck has its own time scale. The Major Arcana are associated with the synodic cycle of the Moon. Wands are days, Pentacles are weeks, Cups are months, and Swords are years. Bear in mind though, that occasionally, this varies depending upon the happening predicted.

If you have cut one of the Major Arcana cards, this represents an unexpected speeding up of events, good or otherwise, the foreshadowing of which will occur within one Lunar Month. This, of course, depends on the nature of the event itself. Should it be possible that the prediction could be fulfilled within a month, then the card cut will fix the time more precisely.

To turn up the Magician shows that the next Quarter of the Moon will see the fulfillment of the issue. Therefore, if you are reading the cards two days after the Full Moon, the events foretold will come about in five days time when the Moon reaches her Third Quarter.

The High Priestess: by or at the next New Moon. The new Moon referred to is, of course, the visible New Moon.

The Empress: something happens within the next twenty-eight days which indicates which way the wind is blowing, but the event itself will not materialize until three months have passed.

The Emperor: The event will occur at the close of one full Lunar Month.

The Hierophant/Pope: five days.

The Lovers: Six days.

The Chariot: Seven days, although frequently, the event occurs within the seven days.

Strength: A full seven days.

The Hermit: The event will occur when the Moon is next at the Third Quarter.

The Wheel of Fortune: Ten days.

Justice: Eleven days.

The Hanged Man: twelve days.

Death: Often, due to an unexpected change in the circumstances of the questioner, the event promised may never come to fruition. (This change need not be for the worse, nor does it necessarily refer to death.)

Temperance: A good outcome within fourteen days.

The Devil: Fifteen days.

The Tower: There are two different interpretations. If the rest of the cards show a financial gain, it will come to pass within seven days. However, if some disaster, or negative influence is seen, it will happen in sixteen days. If the spread refers to neither of these two matters, gather the cards, shuffle and cut again. The Tower, I'm sorry to have to say, is not a reliable time card where other happenings are concerned.

The Star: Seventeen days.

The Moon: Either at the next Full Moon, or by the next Full Moon.

The Sun: Although a foreshadowing of the event will occur within a month, the event itself will not come about for another year.

Judgement: Twenty days.

The World: One full Lunar Month.

The Fool: If the spread shows an unfortunate event, then the disaster is already upon you, if you realize it or not. If the general spread looks good, to turn up the Fool as the time card means that this apparent good fortune will not materialize due to either rash or foolish actions on the questioner's part.

If you have turned up a Major Arcana card and it does not seem possible that the event can occur within one month, reshuffle and cut again. If the second card is also a Major Arcana card, reshuffle and cut again. If the third card reveals a Major Arcana card, however unlikely it may seem, the event will occur within the next Lunar month.

Both Rods and Wands indicate the event will take place within twenty days. However, for those of you who require a more precise timing, here is the time for each card in these suits.

Ace: One day, or occasionally, one week.

Two through Seven: These cards indicate the same number of days as the number in the suit, e.g., Six of Rods is six days, etc.

Eight: Swift receipt of news by word/telephone/letter, hastens the matter.

Nine: Twenty days. (This is the maximum number of days indicated by these suits.)

Ten: Nineteen days.

Page: Eighteen days.

Knight: Seventeen days.

Queen: Sixteen days.

King: Fifteen days.

Pentacles or Coins stand for weeks, except for the court cards which refer to divisions of the year. From the Ace through the ten, this indicates the same number of weeks as the number of the suit, although the Ace can show events occurring within a week. So if you turned over the four of

Pentacles, this would indicate four weeks.

Page: Three months.

Knight: Six months.

Queen: Nine months.

King: Twelve months.

One more thing about the suit of Pentacles. If the questioner is male and the time card is the King of Pentacles, then the financial gain is usually immediate, or will take place within one month of the reading. (I forgot to mention that this is assuming the cards have indicated some financial gain.)

This same timing holds true if the questioner is a female and the time card turned up is the Queen. If the male questioner turns up the Queen of Pentacles as his time card, then this indicates that the event will come about in either nine months or nine weeks. The female turning up the King of Pentacles as her time card will have the expected financial gain within three months or three weeks.

If the time card is from the suit of Cups, and the general spread appears to involve love, affection, a birth or creative work, then this is a good sign. It indicates a successful outcome within one year. Should the spread have dealt with some other aspect of life, each card will have its own significance.

Ace: One week or one month.

Two: Two weeks or two months.

Three: A speedy and unexpected conclusion to events.

Four: Four months.

Five: The event foreseen may well fail to materialize owing to the duplicity of a friend.

Six: Six months.

Seven: A satisfactory outcome to the reading within seven months.

Eight: a prediction of success may not come about due to a change of heart on the part of the Questioner

Nine: Today--by tomorrow at the latest.

Ten: One month.

Page: Two months.

Knight: Two months.

Queen: Three months.

King: seven weeks.

Swords signify years, although only in very rare cases can any card reading predict events that will happen beyond seven years ahead. If the time card is a Sword, then the heavy hand of Saturn will delay the predicted occurrence. Whether this occurrence is pleasant or otherwise is neither hear nor there to the Lord of Limitation.

From the Ace to the seven indicates the same number of years as the number in the suit. So a Three of Swords indicates three years. At the Eight of Swords, we return again to one year, and the Nine of Swords becomes two years, the Ten being three years.

The Page and Knight show that the happening will produce repercussions which continue to affect the Questioner for many years to come, but frequently, some prefiguring event will occur within one Lunar Month.

Queen: Three years.

King: Two years.

I would not advise attempting to use the cards to time events out of context of the Tarot reading.

Gestalt! Sounds like something that would be said in connection with a sneeze, doesn't it? It is probably the most important aspect of a circle, its gestalt or group mind. As individuals, we each have a fairly good idea of who we are and how we interact with others. But (!) all this changes when we work together in a group situation, such as a circle. This change is reinforced by how well we know one another, by the energies raised by the group, and by the regularity and similarity of our rituals. The group may hold a completely different opinion from any of its individual members. The group, or gestalt, will act, and interact with other people or groups, very differently than any one of its members may.

These things have been studied and documented by modern science and have formed the basis of several branches, including psychology and sociology. In the Craft, these things were known for centuries, though not as well documented, and have formed the basis of many of our laws and customs. It is interesting to note that these laws and customs vary only slightly from tradition to tradition and culture to culture, not to mention century to century.

When we work magic as a gestalt, we form a bond with each other that runs deeper than the bond of marriage or family. We ACT as one, we THINK as one, we FEEL as one. We cast the circle and become a single organism, a "hive mind" composed of several individuals. The difference in the energy is unmistakable, even to someone who has had no prior experience. Also, the amount of energy produced rises tremendously. One person working alone raises a certain amount of energy. You would expect two people working together to raise twice as much, right? WRONG! Once there is more than one, and they are working together as a gestalt, or unified, directed circle, the energies do not multiply according to the number of people working. Although I know the numbers change from group to group and time to time, I have found that it works roughly like this: two people raise about four times as much energy as one person working alone. This ratio remains somewhat steady for groups up to four people. At five people, the energy level jumps to ten and seems to stay that way up to about a dozen workers. One dozen people will raise about 100 times as much energy as one person working alone. It may not make sense mathematically, but I have found it true.

A careless word said in circle can be an immediate invocation and cause very quick results. The energy is there waiting to be focused, and because the bond is there, any one member's ideas, words, thoughts, or psychic climate will be immediately fed into the group mind. This is one of the reasons why it is important to keep a written record of your rituals and to follow as it is written, unless a change has been discussed and agreed upon beforehand. Sloppiness in a group working can quickly spell disaster for the group. The energies raised will effect EVERYONE in that group.

This does not, however, rule out spontaneity from the group workings. But such spontaneity must be firmly based with clear visualizations and the energy must be focused. Most often, this job falls to the HPs. She usually maintains the matrix of the group's energy and makes sure that the visualizations are clear to everyone. That matrix IS the ritual, and it acts as the framework upon which the energy is hung so to ensure the success of the ritual. Since the HPs conducts the ritual, it seems natural for her to also hold the vision of what the energy is supposed to do and to keep track of how it is being produced.

But what if the HPs cannot visualize well or cannot see the energy clearly? Does this make her unfit to be a HPs? No, it does not! The visualization can be held by ANY member of the circle. It should be stated so each member can see it in his/her mind, but the vision of what the exact results should be can be held by the HP or any designated member of the circle. It should be stated or understood in what way the energy is to be formed, such as a cone or net or whatever. Some forms are more appropriate for some works than others. Understanding how the vision holder "sees" the energy always helps when others are the ones raising and feeding that energy to the holder.

The HPs need not be a whiz at creating energy forms, nor a powerhouse of energy herself. She doesn't even have to be good at visualizing. She MUST be good at making decisions and at keeping everyone on circle together, co-ordinated and in touch. In other words, she must be able to make the gestalt happen when and where needed. A good HPs must have the qualities of leadership. This does not make her the most knowledgable or most powerful. It means that she knows how to rule; she directs the group Will. She must be compassionate and firm

at the same time. She must understand her people and know how to set them to work in order to achieve the maximum from their energies while harmonizing with the others and their work. She must be able to quickly change her perspective to compensate for the addition or subtraction of someone or their energy. She should be good at spell crafting and ritual performance so that such compensations can be instantly translated into accurate adjustments of the ritual.

The circle is a living, breathing entity, and the HPs must see to the welfare of that entity, of which she is a part, above the welfare or needs of any individual. Hopefully this can be done without harm to any individual. The wrong decision can effect everyone badly. This is the burden of the HPs. Nobody said it would be easy. She must understand that, in circle, the whole is greater than the sum of its parts. And she needs to make the individual members understand this also, as it will make them more motivated to work as a unit, a gestalt.

Just as she must look after the welfare of the circle even above her own or any other member's, so must the HPs look after the welfare of the Craft over that of her circle. Energy misused by one can be a disaster, but energy misused by many can be a catastrophe. The PHs and her circle must work for the good of the Craft, and ultimately for the good of all.

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Aphids, Anyone? (UPI)

Mayor Robert Boyle and other Richmond Heights, Ohio, officials have a better idea for ridding their city of aphids worms. The 100,000 killer ladybugs they have been dumping on the city's foliage may be just the beginning. Boyle says it's cheaper to use ladybugs than pesticides to rid the Cleveland suburb of the aphids worms that have been destroying bushes and trees. He says that if the first batch does their jobs, he plans to call for reinforcements. Boyle says ladybugs, which cost \$45 for four packages of 20,000 to 30,000 are also less dangerous than using chemicals. He says he spent a week emptying boxes of bugs into bushes, trees, and ravines. But he spent nearly equal time explaining what he was doing to curious residents. Boyle said, "They probably thought the mayor was nuts. I didn't go out at night because someone would probably shoot me." Now he says he's trying to buy dragonflies to eat mosquito larvae.

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Of Witch Law and the Tarot by Tarostar

The Past is absolute. The Present is mutable. The Future is nebulous. So many times, as a teacher, and as a writer on Tarot, I hear people say that they believe, but fear having the Tarot read. Many times, also, I hear Readers say that they sugar coat or even refuse to speak out an adverse prognostication. Both attitudes do the Tarot and themselves grave disservice.

The fearful Querent forgoes the insight into his/her affairs that a good Tarot reading can give. The Pollyanna Reader commits a violation of Witch Law by refusing to read the truth of an act of Divination or prognostication.

The fearfulness is understandable on the part of Querents because the Tarot is the one and only true "Magic Mirror of Snow White." Not all who cast a reflection therein are the fairest of them all, more often we have the evil Stepmother seeing the reflection of self. Each Querent, or more particularly prospective Querent, should not be coerced into having a reading, but allowed to decide for him/herself.

The reluctance on the part of a Reader to disclose the portends of a spread is wrong and may be harmful in the long run. The Reader does not know how the symbols in the spread relate to the personal life of the Querent and superficially does not know what the real secret desires of the inner Being really are. However, the Oracle does. By being a Pollyanna, the Reader deprives the Querent of a valuable opportunity to see the reality behind and before his/her current actions, thus not allowing the Querent to make any possible changes and adjustments necessary to offset the results of an indicated ill.

The future portends, be they good or ill, are only the most logical conclusion of a Querent's present course of action. If good is the result, that is surely the course to follow. If, however, bad is indicated, the real gift of Divination comes into play. It allows us to make whatever changes as are right and necessary to set off a new path, thus bringing a different Future. That is the reason for the Arts of Divination. They help to properly navigate life. Portends in a psychic reading of any kind are not absolute and unavoidable. The choice for the Present rests with each and every individual alone. Call the cards as they fall and allow the Querent to do, or not do, as he/she feels is best with his/her own life situation.

Do not try to direct, nor advise, the Querent in any of the choices. Simply explain, as clear as possible, what the cards indicate, to the Querent's satisfaction, and allow the prognostication to sink in as best it is able.

Pollyannas, of either sex, in reading the cards, leave their own reputation and psychic insight highly suspect. We may not look only at what aspects of life please us. There are negatives that must be experienced and dealt with. The Reader does not know how, or why, that individual was drawn to him/her for a reading in the first place, but the Oracle does.

Be honest, straightforward, but not brutally blunt, and the Craft Arts of Divination will blossom forth from one as they should.

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Power Behind the Crone: The Art and the Artist by Blacksun

I assume that the education that I got growing up in the USA is similar in many respects to the education in most other parts of the Western culture. Differences abound, of course, in methods, focus of interests, testing and teaching procedures, etc., but one thing that I believe is very similar between all the educational systems in America and Europe and other areas dominated by the people of Europe, is the overall philosophy and underlying assumptions upon which the education of the populace is structured. Much of that structure and philosophy is the product of Greek thought. It would seem that when we say "logic," we mean a system of thought analysis and information management which has been named after its most notable and popular proponent and user, Aristotle. Aristotelian Logic is raised close to the heights of the word of God in most of Western society's education. It is a template of correct thinking and any deviation from it is cause for the academic-minded to point their finger and call "fraud" upon the wayward thinker.

It must be recognized that there are avenues of inquiry which do not lend themselves well to this rigid structuring of thought. It should come as no surprise to anyone who is of the Craft that religion and magic fall into this category. Our very language that we use to communicate knowledge and discuss experiences and formulate questions at times seems to stand in the way. It is built around this template of "logic" which has proven so very useful to our material (tool using) culture. Often, however, language seems to fail us when we want to discuss that wonderful feeling or this wonderful experience. We seem to be faced with something very akin to the problem of describing a beautiful sunset to one who is blind. Logic, and its shadow-like companion, reason, are blind to some things. And to use them in our form of communication is frustrating and fruitless.

It takes an artist to communicate who the Goddess is or what magic feels like. Poetry, sculpture, dance, drawing and painting, these are all ways that have been used to try to transmit these non-logical thoughts and experiences. If a person is not good at one or another of these art forms, however, it is often felt that they cannot communicate the great "secrets" of the Craft or relate the magical experiences. And this idea (wrong as it is) will sometimes lead us to believe that that person is not good at magic or not wise in the Craft. This is simply not so.

We ALL are artists. It is one of the gifts that has been given to all things that live. Our lives are the canvas upon which we paint our visions. Those who love us can see the divine art that we portray. When we make love to another, we share our visions and weave another which is the combination of our and their artistry. The same is true when we are in circle with others. Ritual magic is a sharing of artistries which is beyond logic and reason. It is a beautiful tapestry of life energy, an orgy of air, earth, fire, water, and spirit--the flaming pentacle of love and trust which forms the bond which we feel as our religion.

"All acts of pleasure are mine own," says the Goddess. True pleasure is Art. It is never solitary, even if we are without company. It connects us with the universe and all the artists within it. The galleries of Art which are our circles are sacred and divine at the same time. Let all who enter in, do so in Perfect Love and Perfect Trust. So mote it be.

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The Future (UPI)

We all wonder what the future will be like. The children's newspaper, Weekly Reader, took a survey. It asked their young readers what they think the world will be like when they're as old as their parents are now. Some of the most striking answers were those of students grades four through junior high about their expectations for the changing role of women. Students were asked to rank their agreement to a list of nine statements about the future. The statement marked most often was one that said women and men will be treated equally. Next in line was agreement with the statement that there will have been a woman president by the time the students are adults. The Weekly Reader says these were the top choices for boys and girls in all regions of the United States and in all grades. Some 625,000 children in second grade through junior high participated in the survey. The results are taken from a random sample of 100,000 replies. The overwhelming majority of students also said they expect to be married and most said they'd have two or three children. The older the student was, the more he or she thought that child care will be shared by both parents. The survey also found children surprisingly positive about their own futures. Weekly Reader editor-in-chief Terry Borton says although children think many situations such as the danger of nuclear war, pollution and hunger will be worse, they expect their own lives will be better. The students in the survey also said they believe they control their futures, not "government," or "business."

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Commentary on "The Law of an Anarchist" by Tarostar

Nine years ago, the Circle of Star Meadow drew down the Goddess and she spoke. The essence of Her Revelation runs thus: God/Goddess is calling all Covens of true initiatory tradition back together again. Many groups have an insight into the Mystery Faith of the Craft, but not one contains it all. Fragmented and apart, the true Craft has preserved its inner core during the long Night of Time. She asked the Elders of Star Meadow if they were able to undertake a Quest. In the awe of silence before the Goddess, each Elder saw his/her own heart revealed to its inner depths. She fathomed each and every one. Smiling, she laid a charge upon the younger Elders to bring forth the Laws of the Craft, as preserved by Star Meadow, and revitalize them to fit the modern World. She did not say how, nor in what manner the Laws were to be rewritten. Only that the Spirit of the Craft itself will inspire as it is needed.

All Elders received the same revelation at the same time. The older ones knew they were to aid the younger ones to undertake the task. Not every step was clear, nor were the understandings of the Goddess's purpose, but all present perceived the same "Blue Lady" in their midst. Most of the older ones have now crossed the veil and only two or three of the rest of us who were there remain. A spiritual overshadowing has guided our hands and inspirations to bring forth the Laws of the Craft and compile them into The Sacred Pentagraph, a work in five volumes. It is by no means totally complete to date, nine years later.

The article by Blacksun, saying how difficult such a task is, is understandable in the light that it is being done on a Human level, by Humans, for Humans. Not once did the article mention God/Goddess, as the source of Craft Law. It seemed to indicate the new Laws were for the group, by the group and at the consensus of the group. Therein, I think, lies the rub. God/Goddess do not say that each and every individual must be accommodated. Nor do they try to do so. It is not for the group to try and express its Will in the Laws, but to express the Will of the God/Goddess. Many Laws will then seem harsh or hard to fathom and it will be up to the group and its members to live up to the standard set down. Not for the group to set up its own standard. It is through the true Laws of the Mystery Religion that Adepts of the Future will be trained and taught. If some of your laws do not lead to pondering enigmas, they perhaps are not inspired.

Forget Lady Sheba, forget the Alex Sanders' Laws, they contain only hints, but no inner truths. They were conceived by individuals and made up to sound "Witchy." I would ask Blacksun to hold a Drawing Down the Moon, at the Full Moon of October four days before the Witch's New Year--Hallowmas. Seek the inspiration of the Goddess to reveal Her Will in the Laws of the Craft and to send forth the inspiration of the Spirit of the Craft. You may be surprised at what the Laws of the Craft really are. Those based on books by various authors are only the exoteric outer Court of the Craft. However, it is through them that admittance to the inner levels are gained. Seek not to please persons with your Laws, but to reflect Deity. Then and only then can and will all persons be served.

Just flew back from the 1985 Grand Council of the Covenant of the Goddess (and boy, are my arms tired--yuk, yuk). The Covenant has started its second decade in good form. We dealt with a lot of complex issues at the Grand Council and, after a two-day business meeting, emerged from the meeting room singing, "We are an old people, we are a new people." A trip to the airport Labor Day, back home to Seattle late that night, and off to work the next day. Oy! And I thought three-day weekends were supposed to be restful! I picked up the mail from the New Wiccan Church mailbox on Saturday. I haven't read past page 10, but I feel I must reply to Thor of Connecticut's letter. I take exception with Thor's statement that the Burning Times are over. We have the power to forestall and even prevent them, but I am not comfortable with Thor's viewpoint of "These are our rights; let us stand on and for them, for they will protect us." I continue to hear reports from around the country about how people in the Craft are persecuted for their beliefs (fired, barns burnt down, ostracized by entire communities, run out of town, etc.) which, though unconstitutional and a violation of civil rights, are the realities of the situation. Although these people have been wronged, how shall they gain redress? Even assuming that the people responsible for these crimes were found and held liable in a suit for violations of civil rights, what does this really do for the person run out of town, victimized, or whose every belonging has been burnt? I agree with Thor that the right to worship freely is guaranteed by the Constitution, but I do not feel that this enjoins everybody to immediately come out of the closet. Even though I do not believe that I will be fired for my beliefs nor ostracized in my neighborhood, I also do not believe that it will improve my relationships with my co-workers and neighbors. In my opinion, the most effective way to support the Craft is to demonstrate the type of people we are and make friends with others exclusive of our religion. It was Franklin, I believe, who said, "A man's prejudice was not argued into him, and it won't be argued out of him." When someone says, "Boy, what rotten people pagans are," I can respond, "That's not true. Pagans are pretty good." I can even add, "Am I a rotten person? I'm a pagan and neither I nor any of the pagans I know do any of the things you say pagans do." The speaker now has two opposing beliefs to choose between: what s/he has heard versus what s/he knows from personal experience. At this point, it is the quality of my relationship with the speaker that takes over. If the speaker knows me as a good person,

reliable and trustworthy, then the example I have been is likely to outweigh any drivel the speaker has encountered. This is how to "Guard the mysteries, reveal them constantly." I have come out of the broom closet a few times with people that I wanted to have know about my beliefs and practices, but I have not made a general announcement of my religion to the world, nor, I note, does almost anybody else. I work with Catholics, Episcopalians, Southern Baptists, a Christian fundamentalist, and a doubtless wide variety of other miscellaneous Protestant sects that I don't know about, simply because the subject doesn't come up. I am not in this religion to proselytize. I am interested in seeing more public acceptance and understanding of my religion. I believe saying, "I'm a pagan," frequently hinders personal relationships and does not further public acceptance of the Craft. Starting a relationship with someone with the announcement of your religion allows the other person's own misconceptions to color their perceptions of your actions thereafter. I agree with Thor that we as pagans need not retrace our steps. We can learn from history. We have a great opportunity to help people understand what we do, and to further religious freedom for others as well as ourselves. I applaud the openness with which Thor is able to lead his life and am very glad to see him actively working for the preservation and furtherance of the Craft, but I prefer different tactics and strategy. It was not the people who were killed by the Inquisition that kept the Craft alive, it was the ones who went underground and taught privately that kept things going.

Ed note (LF): Just before press time, we received information from a very reliable source that a bill has passed the Senate by voice vote rescinding the IRS tax exempt status from religious groups practicing Witchcraft. Now, because of our non-profit status, we cannot comment on political activity, so we won't. We'll simply tell you that the last we heard is that the bill is on the way to the House, where a similar bill has already been proposed. We'll let you take it from there...and we'll try to have more info on this next month. If you have anything, such as news clippings, copy of the bill, etc., please send it in.

And what a tale we have to tell! Only the beginning of it, for we are sure there will be much, much more to come. We know there will be if we have anything to do with it, for we are furious and intend to pursue the matter as far as possible.

A bit of background: In early Spring a friend of Lady Galadriel and Lord Athanor gave the group permission to use his land (a rural spot outside Atlanta) as our outdoor Temple. The group spent many hours clearing the site, building a stone altar, ringing the circle with stones, erecting cornerstones, planting herbs, etc. All were delighted with the spot and were willing to expend their time and energy in working to make the site as beautiful as possible.

Sabbats and Esbats were celebrated there and we felt very fortunate to have such a spot. At no time did we have any indication that anyone resented our being there. There were never any "wild parties" or disturbances of any kind--this was our Temple, we certainly would not desecrate it! As the spot was completely surrounded by dense woods, we felt there was also a natural sound barrier. Everyone would be gone shortly after midnight, or sooner, for most of the group are working folks who must be at work the next day.

In late July one of the group went out to the site and discovered that vandals had struck. Cornerstones had been overturned, a number of items had been stolen (statuary, cauldron, candles, etc.). Everyone was heartsick, to say the least. But, we got busy, rebuilt the altar, replaced the cornerstones, cleaned up the mess, put things back in order and felt we had learned a lesson--don't leave removable items unattended--especially in a place that is infested with red-neck teenagers!

Now to the gist of the tale: On Wednesday, September 18, two of our members went out to the site to do a bit of "housekeeping." To their horror they found that someone else had been there and much damage had been done to the circle, a cross had been erected in the center of the fire pit, the place was in shambles, and the words "Jesus Saves" and "In God We Trust" were scratched into the Earth in front of the Altar. They rushed back to inform Lady Galadriel of what had happened. Oddly enough, at that time the gentleman who owns the land was visiting with Lady Galadriel. He, too, was outraged. He left, stating that as soon as he reached

home he would file a complaint with the police. Shortly after he left the phone rang... it was a Lieutenant from the county police, informing Lady Galadriel that the police had been notified that the neighbors at the site had formed a coalition "to stop the Witches" and had called a press conference for that evening to complain about the witches and the fact that the police would not do anything to stop them! A bit more conversation which boiled down to "stay away from out there or someone may get hurt."

An emergency meeting of the Grove was called for that evening to discuss the situation. All were outraged, but common sense prevailed and all agreed that the best thing to do is to refrain from going out there again. We're sure everyone can understand our sense of violation and frustration in such a situation. In the middle of the meeting the phone rang--it was a reporter from the local paper who had been at the meeting of the neighbors and wanted to hear our side of it. Lady Galadriel spoke with her at length and two somewhat sympathetic articles appeared in Thursday's papers.

THEN--the next evening (Thursday, September 19) we were even more outraged by local TV coverage of the matter. On one station we were treated to full views of the site with police, reporters and "curious spectators" (as quoted by the media) crawling all over the circle. Some of the comments made were less than flattering, to say the least, and many were out and out falsehoods. Then we turned to another station and were even more shocked--they showed basically the same scenes, but with shots of people desecrating the circle site! One man was shown in the act of dismantling the Altar, stone by stone, "to find out what is in there...", while everyone stood by, watching, and allowed him to do so! Another was shown picking up stones from the circle ring "as a keepsake."

We were outraged not only by the actions of these people, but by the fact that others stood by and watched as they desecrated our place of worship. We can't help but wonder what would have happened if such a thing had occurred at "the little white church in the wildwood!" Shock waves would have raced across the city and the uproar would have been felt nationwide.

Now it was our turn to act/react. And act we did. Lady Galadriel immediately contacted the TV stations to register

her protest. One station sent an interviewer out that same evening and a small segment of her response was presented on the eleven o'clock news that night. The other TV station responded the next day (Friday), did an interview, and presented another small segment that evening.

Several radio stations touched on the matter briefly. One, however, may be named in our law suits... announcers on the station made many derogatory remarks about our religion in general and about our group. One can understand that uncomplimentary statements may be made by participants on a "call-in-talk-show," but you would expect announcers to be more professional than to air their own personal opinion. Unfortunately, no one was able to tape the programs at the time, but we are requesting tape transcripts from the station under F.C.C. Regulation 73:234. (Thanks to Pat of the Georgians for passing out information on that subject many years ago--even our attorney was not familiar with the regulation and was delighted to learn about it.) (F.C.C. Regulation 73:234--Attack Against a Person or Group)

Lady Galadriel has had several radio interviews and one interviewer plans on putting together a taped program which will go across the nation via satellite. No date for this as yet. The program is "Southwind," so if you hear of it in your area, tune us in! Also, a live TV interview is scheduled for Wednesday, October 2, on the local NBC station noonday news.

Monday, September 23, we "got in OUR licks," so to speak, through a local radio talk show: WSB AM750--"Sound-Off," 9 p.m. weeknights. It is a four-hour program which covers two-thirds of the states--a 75,000 watt station. Reference was made to the news about the witches, then WE started calling in. Not all of us were able to get through--the phone lines were jammed--but many of us did manage to "speak our piece." The program began with the talk show host being a bit snide and tongue-in-cheek, ended with him being defensive of us and our rights. AND an invitation to Lady Galadriel to appear on his program as a guest interviewee. Needless to say, she accepted, although a date has not yet been set. (We'll try to let as many know as possible when a definite date has been established.) Lady Galadriel is a very good speaker, mentally quick on her feet, armed with a vast amount of knowledge, and able to express herself clearly and concisely, even under adverse conditions. We look

forward to the program--it should be a good one! (Note: Lady Galadriel is not typing this, folks... so we can say these things.)

There were calls from Pennsylvania, New York, Tennessee, Kentucky, the Carolinas, and many other states. Of course, there were those of opposing views who called in to voice their opinion, and the usual garbage one expects to hear when the subject of witchcraft is brought up. But it was very rewarding to note how many people expressed a positive, tolerant attitude. We look forward to the upcoming program--it should be just as interesting and informative. And perhaps educational for some of the listening audience--at least those who may open their ears just a little and HEAR what is being said.

Since this report was begun, there has been another development. The plot begins to thicken (or should we spell that "sicken?"). One of the group members who had let his religion be known, and had been overheard on the radio talk show, was dismissed from his job. The supervisor who gave him the news almost told him the true reason he was being dismissed, but caught himself just in time, then made the lame excuse that the fellow "just wasn't a team player." Which is ludicrous, as the man had received several commendations from management for the great job he was doing. What will we do? We don't know at this point--no one else was present when the supervisor was speaking with him, so he has no witnesses to what the man said. Without proof, there is little one can do. We are all sick and tired of the derogatory remarks, being run out of places, and being generally classed as "low-life" because of our beliefs. The group members are in complete agreement with this, and so far most of them have said they are willing to go public, if necessary. All of us have something to lose by exposure, but we all feel that we have much more to gain! We intend to take every opportunity to present our viewpoint and to stand up, publicly, for what we believe in. We realize that many people don't believe they can take the chance of going public, realizing the possible repercussions. None

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Apologetic from a Friend

That rascal Aristotle. We do not know much about his church-goin' habits. We do know he was not a catholic. He died in 322 bce. While he lived, he collected quite a library of manuscripts, a wide array of maps and he kept an assortment of animals from all around the known world.

As a student he was troublesome: questioning and argumentative. He openly disagreed with the common wisdom and great minds of his day.

A small part of what he left the world as notes along his path is now called syllogistic logic. For its day, his logic was quite a feat. He was attempting to map uncharted territory. Today, logicians study Aristotelian logic primarily for its historic value; but it still gets around. One way or another, you got some in high school or were influenced by someone who had some. Even if mama taught you at home, you've probably been exposed to it some place along the line. Some folks would say you need a salve to banish the virus from you. Some would proclaim that the seed of a flower has been cast to the wind.

What is this thing then that Aristotle is supposed to have done? Most of the problem is rooted in two elements. The first is the language of the Greeks. To the ancient greek, for a word to describe something that thing must exist in some manner. It led Aristotle and his predecessors to do

some tall rambling and picking of nits that only serve to frustrate and elude us today. The second element is a bit of logic known as the rule of excluded middle. The rule is sometimes stated: $P \vee \neg P$. What it means is that something is one of the type of object under consideration, or it is not. So far, so good. The problem arises when we try to apply the rule and then lend credence to our conclusions. Because if either you are one of us or you aren't one of us; and we know you aren't one of us (because you do not do the dance of the Oh No Tooky Bird or because your eyes are the wrong color) then you must be one of Them. Now, we know we are good. If we are good and they are not us, then they are not good. So, they are bad. Seems too simple, does it not? It is. Further, it is NOT logical. But, if it were; if Mr. Spock were to decree that our conclusion was quite logical, it is important to remember that he has not said anything about us or them or good or bad. It does not mean he agrees with our conclusion. Most folks say, "That's logical," and they mean, "I like that." Some people have read a book or two and when they say, "That's logical," they mean, "I don't even have a snappy comeback for that." There are a few who have considered logic itself and found it to reach from the foundations of mathematics to the skeleton of philosophy. They concern themselves with forms of inference. Should they utter, "logical," in reference to a conclusion they would most likely mean that the conclusion was the product of assumptions manipulated in manners which are demonstrably sound or valid. Still, they would not be commenting on the truth or falsity of either assumptions or conclusions.

This logic thing appears to be no small area to describe. But a fellow some 2320 years ago started and it has not stopped since, except for some brief stagnant interludes.

Did I mention that some of the good pagan ministry of the day wanted to bring charges of impiety against Aristotle? Impiety was a capital crime in those days. Seems as how the ol' boy did not believe in sacrifices, among other things. Aristotle might have reasoned:
