

It is clear that the Soviet regime is held in place by force and is superimposed over the natural Aquarius-Saturn-8 idea forces of Russia itself, which, if liberated, would probably coalesce around a different destiny arrangement. If internal Russia has always been characterized by unrest, it has achieved inordinate proportions under Soviet rule, necessitating the enormous resources of the KGB to hold the people in check.

The numerological epochs/can now be delineated on the basis of those years that add up to the destiny numbers of 7, 8 and 9, using 1917 (the founding year of the Soviet regime) as the starting point, and each of these epochs can be characterized by their rank numerical order. There have so far been seven epochs, with the eighth beginning in 1987.

The first epoch: ruler, Sun-1 - expansion, creativity, acceptance

- 1924 - Neptune-7
- 1925 - Saturn-8
- 1926 - Mars-9

During this epoch the Revolution stabilized itself, and by 1924 diplomatic recognition of the Soviet Union by most countries in the world, including the United States, had taken place. Lenin died in 1924, and by 1926 Stalin had emerged as sole leader. During these three

years there was a great deal of internal strife, but the Soviet regime extended its physical influence into other near-by countries, and its intellectual (Communist) influence throughout the world.

The second epoch: ruler, Moon-2 - covert creativity

- 1933 - Neptune-7
- 1934 - Saturn-8
- 1935 - Mars-9

Internal strife characterized this period, and Stalin's covert manipulations had blossomed, culminating, in 1935, with the beginning of the Stalin purges.

The third epoch: ruler, Jupiter-3 - expansion

- 1942 - Neptune-7
- 1943 - Saturn-8
- 1944 - Mars-9

During this epoch, the world was involved in World War II which had particularly harsh consequences for Russia. But in 1944, Russia's armies swept through most of East Europe "liberating" Berlin in 1945. It is from this period that Russia acquired lasting influence over many East-European countries and expanded the ranks of the Soviet Union as a result.

The fourth epoch: ruler, Uranus-4 - disruption, eccentricity, strangeness

- 1951 - Neptune-7
- 1952 - Saturn-8
- 1953 - Mars-9

In this period Stalin died, and Khrushchev emerged as leader of the Soviet Union. under the Mars-9 aspects of 1953. Khrushchev was the first major Soviet leader not born under either the Mars-9 or Neptune-7 destiny years. Born in 1894, his destiny year was to be that of Uranus-4. It was during this epoch that the Korean war took place, ascribed by the West to Soviet instigation.

The fifth epoch: ruler, Mercury-5 - intellectual, plotting and planning, over-extension of intellectual confidence

We have seen earlier that Khrushchev, as a power-name, was the Venus-6. This, together with his Uranus-4 destiny number, although mutually receptive to the Mars-9 Neptune-7 axis, would indicate his eventual unsuitability to the stronger axis. He was eventually removed from power in 1964. During this epoch, the Cuban missile crisis took place, in which the

Soviets tried to infiltrate secretly missiles into Cuba. This covert move was foiled by Kennedy.

The sixth epoch: ruler, Venus-6 - peace, negotiation, intellectual and artistic exchange

1960 - Neptune-7

1961 - Saturn-8

1962 - Mars-9

During this epoch Brezhnev consolidated his power and the concept of detante reached a new respectability. But the dissident movement in Russia among artists, writers and intellectuals emerged. The USSR equipped Egypt's army.

The seventh epoch: ruler, Neptune-7 - covert destruction,

1978 - Neptune-7

1979 - Saturn-8

1980 - Mars-9

Detente notwithstanding, the Soviets had been covertly extending their influence throughout the world, especially into South and Latin America. Their plans to invade Afghanistan culminated in their invasion of that country in December 1979 where the Neptunian weapons of gasses and poisons have been employed.

Each of these epochs is actually nine years long, beginning after each of the years that adds up to nine. but culminating in the years that total 7, 8 and 9.

The present epoch, the eighth (Saturn-8) will culminate in 1987, 1988 and 1989, as we shall see.

Some of the astrology of these different epochs is of interest, if minimal compared to the numerological phasings.

During the first epoch -- 1924-26 -- the planet Saturn was in Scorpio indicating, among other things, that Russia would be subservient to the dominant Mars-9 of the Soviet regime.

During the second epoch -- 1933-35 -- Saturn was in Aquarius, and since this epoch was governed by the Moon-2, we saw a temporary reemergence of the recognizable Saturn-8 Moon-2 relationship of the Romanov dynasty, dramatized, this time, by Stalin.

The third epoch -- 1942-44 -- was clouded by the issues involved with World War II. Uranus and Saturn were in conjunction during 1942 in the sign Taurus, this ominous conjunction probably having more bearing on the world as a whole rather than Russia in particular. But

the conjunction of these two powerful planets, both intimately connected to Aquarius and thus to Russia, probably served, in the occult sense, to bring vast power to the Russian war efforts in general, and ultimately to Stalin's Soviet plans in particular.

During the fourth epoch, Saturn was in the sign of Libra where it is exalted, but earlier in the epoch it was in Virgo. Saturn was in these same relationships very early in the Soviet regime's history -- 1919-23 -- while the regime was consolidating itself after the Revolution. Again, then, in the 1940's, the Soviets consolidated their strengths after World War II had come to a close.

During the fifth and sixth epochs, the major astrological aspects were more in favour of other countries than they were for Russia.

In the seventh epoch however -- 1978-79 -- the planets Saturn, Jupiter and Mars were in Virgo. Mars was in Virgo when on November 7, 1917 the Soviet regime was established in Russia. It was again in Virgo when the Soviets invaded Afghanistan in 1979. The placement of Mars in Virgo -- or Scorpio -- is especially significant in relationship to the Soviet's aggressive moves, as anyone can keep track of by comparing the various aggressions with an ephemeris.

The next two epochs of the Soviet regime -- the eighth and ninth -- will be of particular interest, for their dominant ruling idea-forces will be, respectively, those of Saturn-8 and Mars-9.

The eighth epoch: ruler, Saturn-8 - destructiveness

- 1987 - Neptune-7
- 1988 - Saturn-8
- 1989 - Mars-9

According to all the astrological and numerological principles used to construct the contents of this book, this eighth epoch should be one of extraordinary importance. We can see all the important numerological cycles associated with Russia itself converging in the year 1988. This eighth epoch will be the first epoch ruled by the natural ruler of Russia itself -- Saturn.

Since this epoch began in 1981, the stresses and strains internal to Russia have begun to become apparent. Brezhnev, since his death, has had three successors; and the confusions at the top this must have caused can only indicate the depth of the confusions further down in the Soviet heirarchy, and thence into the Russian populace as a whole.

As of this writing, the world awaits to see in what direction the new Soviet leader, Gorbachev, will guide the regime.

According to the numerological processes enunciated in this book, themselves in strict accord with earlier successful uses of them made by past occultists, Gorbachev is the first Soviet leader whose numerology and astrological attributes are out of phase with the Soviet structure. He is, for example, the first leader to be born in a destiny year (1931) that totals to the Mercury-5, and it is only his power name (Mars-9) that locks him at all into the Mars-9 Neptune-7 whole.

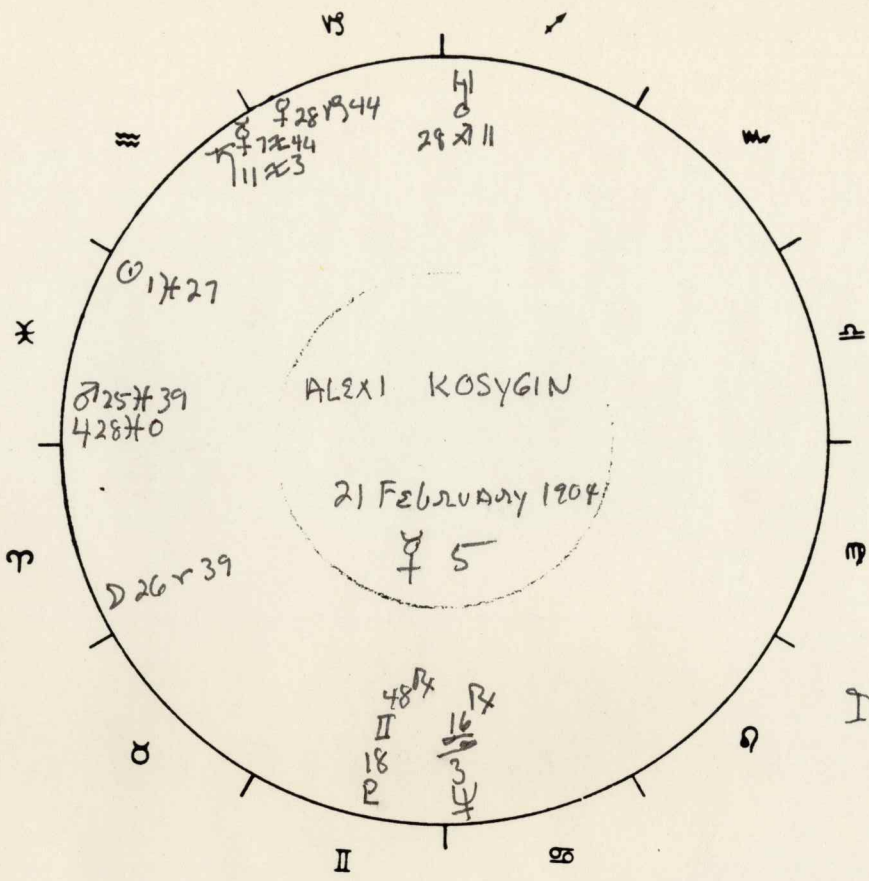
His destiny number, being Mercury-5, places him in a stranger relationship to the Soviet regime than either Khrushchev (Uranus-4) or Chernenko (Jupiter-3). His horoscope indicates him to have expansive Jupiterian qualities (ego), but Mars is in detriment in Cancer and Neptune is weak in Virgo.

In considering the year 1988, perhaps even more significant than Gorbachev's personal destiny, is the fact that the ominous planets Uranus and Saturn will again be in conjunction, this time in the astrological sign of Sagittarius. We can remember here that the last time this baleful conjunction took place, it was in the sign of Cancer (Sagittarius' opposition sign) during the course of World War II.

The conjunction of these two co-rulers of Aquarius -- and thus of Russia -- is certainly to bring on eccentric effects within that country. But it is also certainly to affect those countries ruled by the sign Sagittarius. These are France, Italy, Hungary, Spain and especially the old Arabia, now divided into the countries of Saudi Arabia, Yemen, Southern Yemen, Oman, the United Arab Emirates, Qatar, Kuwait and several interrelates zones. In 1989, this conjunction will move into the astrological sign of Capricorn, affecting accordingly Bulgaria, Lithuania, the old Bosnia, India and Mexico.

The disruptive effects of these two planets whether separately or co-joined are among the most well-attested facets in astrology.

The ninth epoch of the Soviet regime, if it comes to pass, will be in the years 1996, 1997 and 1998. This epoch will be dominated by the Mars-9 idea-forces, the features of which have been already outlined in this book.

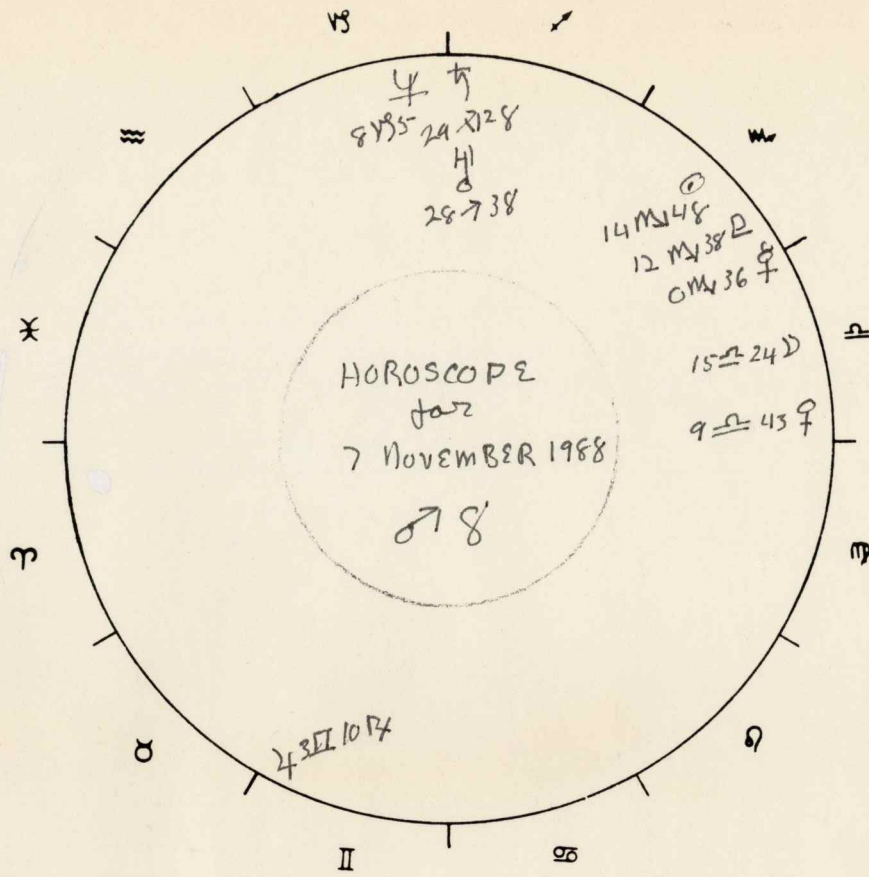
The horoscopes of Kosygin and Gorbachev have several aspects in common -- besides the fact that these two Soviet leaders are the only ones born in a year whose current of destiny number is the Mercury-5. The personal abilities of these two men may have been sufficient enough to allow them to rise to the top, but overall these may not be strong enough for them to maintain or retain power over the Soviet regime; and in Kosygin's case he quickly lost power to Brezhnev whose destiny number being Neptune-7

Mars-9 tendencies of the Soviet regime itself.

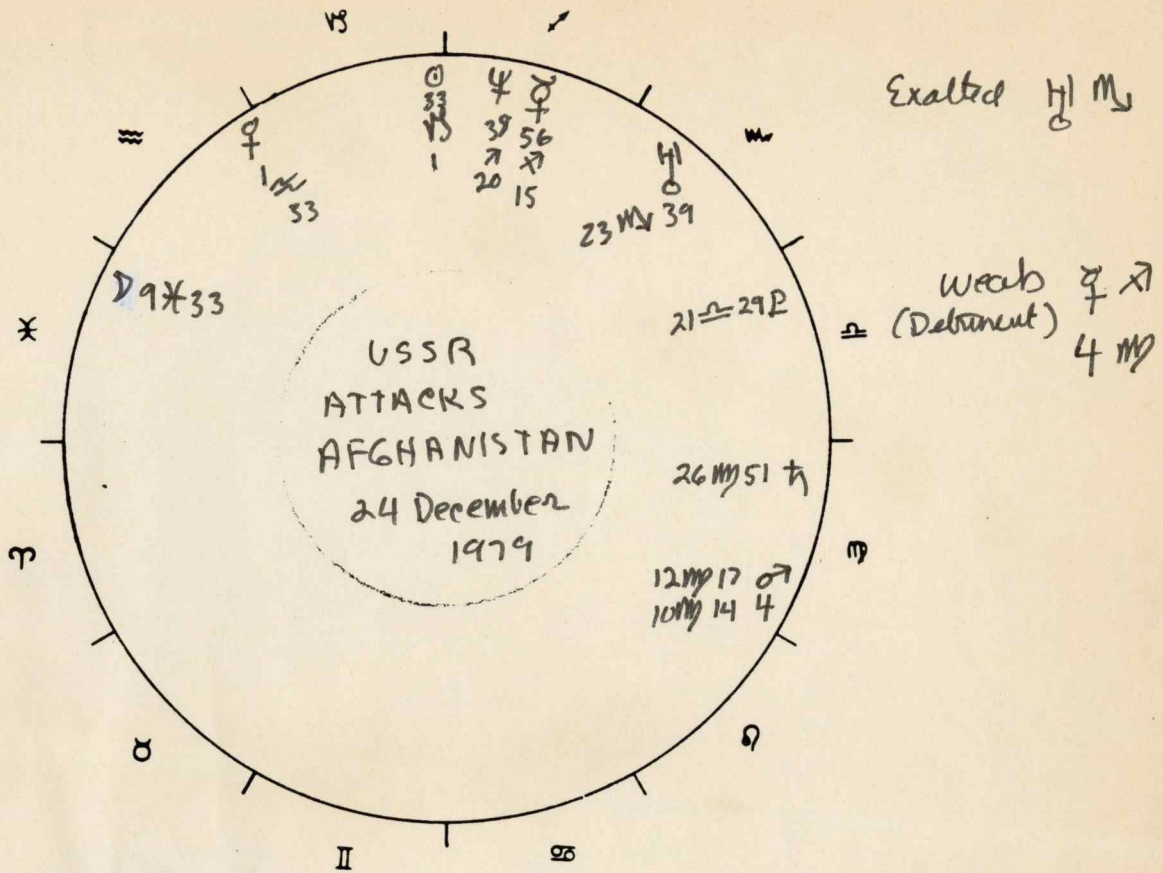
Neither of these charts show a particularly strong relationship to the Mars-9 aspects of the regime, and one might anticipate that both men might reside in their positions in a figurehead capacity -- as was indeed the case of Kosygin -- while active power passes into the hands of others. Of the two charts, Kosygin's was probably the strongest, having his Neptune exalted in Pisces, but retrograde. Gorbachev has Mars in detriment in Cancer and Neptune weak in Virgo. Gorbachev's aspects reveal a "glittery" personality over Kosygin's more dour one. Kosygin's power name totals the Neptune-7 while Gorbachev's is the Mars-9. But these/probably are not enough to allow them to maintain power since their destiny number is out of keeping with the destiny numbers of the regime itself.

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seventy-first anniversary of the Soviet regime. Prior to that, Mars will be again in Virgo in August-October 1987. On January 24, 1988 Mars will become conjunct to the baleful conjunction of Saturn and Uranus. For the world in general this three-planet conjunction (very rare) will probably be very meaningful, with particular importance to the Soviet regime, governed as it is by Mars and the two co-rulers of Aquarius, and Russia, Saturn and Uranus.



The aggressive Mars pattern can be tracked all through the aggressive history of the Soviet regime. Mars was in Aries at the time of Lenin's birth, and in Virgo when the Soviet regime was first established established in 1917. Mars has often been in Scorpio during times of Soviet expansion and international instigations. Mars was again in Virgo when the Soviets invaded Afghanistan on December 24, 1979, although this move had, of course, long been planned and prepared for. Mars will again be in Scorpio on November 7, 1988, the
