Dear Ron and Mary Sue -

Sorry to not have written sooner, but I have noted your letter of 4 December and that you would enjoy hearing from me more often. My hearty salutations on the 25th anniversary.

Reading back over some of my old correspondence, a lot of it really sounds strange - the goal of getting into the clogged worlds of science via parasensory demonstration. Yet this has been successful, and as a scientologist and as a human specimen who has dumped a lot of the reactive mind, I suppose I have achieved a "first" in the area of operativeness exterior to the body. I have held this performance solely to the scientific sector; have spend endless time trying to find out what is going on in this branch of science; and have demonstrated only what the parapsychologists themselves were in search of. Hence there has been no overwealm (and I had to bust my rear to do even those things.) Result: respect, good indicators majorly, and a deepening interest of many leading scientists in my career as a scientologist. Recently, I have permitted certain activities in the public sector (press), mainly to see how I will be treated. I have published a book on all my work and viewpoints, a copy of which I hope you have received by now. Following up on all this publicity, as a test case, I have just finished doing some 40 TV and radio interviews throughout the USA, and have been giving interviews here in my studio (ATV, England (arranged through Artie Maren), and Nippon TV, for instance, as well as many others.) Result: good at this time. I have not wanted to engage the public sector, via the press, unless I could predict a positive result. Will keep you informed periodically on this activity. My personal gains have been tremendous, if you will understand that merely five years ago I was a cringing sissy who could confront no one at all. And now in only a month, 40 national interviews, ALL of which were conducted wonderfully.

I have noticed, however, in my meanderings through the scientific establishment, that the real action is in sociology and political science; it seems to be from these sectors that what is to be thought is dictated, what foundations and funds are to be allocated to what, etc. Here are two fields that have NEVER had any interest to me, but now I find that if I am to continue to yield cultural poise in the world - as I suppose is the hat of an opinion leader - I will have to poke around in these two fields. Thus, my next project. Sociologists appear to rule the mind of man, the world. So I am going to go into their midst.
