Dear Ron,

Just thought I'd report on an interesting development. As you know, I have targeted professional scientists and sociologists, etc., as my realm of interest. I was able in a prior letter to suggest that the respect for Scientology in these areas was real, although somewhat passive. Thus, I opted for the reverse vector in my dissemination, a tactic that I hoped would put these areas somewhat on the reach for Scientology data. Now in a recent publication of the newsletter of the Association for Humanistic Psychology, in a review of my book, Dr. Stanley Krippner (president of several professional fellowships) has wished, in print, for "more details about his (mine) training in Scientology." Subsequent to this, I am now beginning to receive calls from scientists who get around to asking for recommendations about what Scientology books to begin reading. This is a good win for me. It seems trust and respect builds slowly, but I have made good speed at that.

Also, I see that you have been made a goodwill ambassador to the Cherokee nation. I had targeted the Cherokee nation thru its chief, Bill Keeler, as a third dynamic group into which Scientology as a whole might be integrated, since their educational needs are so urgent. I proposed an entire program to this end to Mr. Keeler over a year and a half ago, and I would assume this latest news to be a positive step in that direction.

Now that these overall interests have come into existence at the third dynamic levels for these special groups, it ought to be easy for me to propose that these interested groups begin to invite Scientology speakers to their seminars, etc. I will liaise with Arty Maren and Yvonne on this.

Would hope all this lengthy strategy meets with your approval.
