Dear Ed,

What a great conversation we had last evening. Clearly you and your colleagues represent a new, vital cutting edge in the understanding and uses of consciousness and its many mysterious qualities. I had hoped to live to witness this development, and so you can imagine how meaningful it is to me.

As mentioned in our talk, I have been in retreat for some time, but not inactive. It was a great pleasure for me to help originate and develop remote viewing -- through the hard years it took to do so. But I have long been aware that RV is only an initial step. There are many problems to be understood, and once understood, need to be functionally penetrated and put to work.

I have made breakthroughs in at least four areas, any of which, with patience, could contribute to dynamic enlargements of the scope of RV.

1. Future-seeing: Even with excellent RV capabilities, penetrating the future with regard to establishing kinds of events and their potential timings has always been difficult. As a result of my year-long future-seeing project (archive copy included herein), I can now erect a "grid" in which future-event potentials are locatable with regard to their approximate nature and approximate future dates of their occurrence. This grid allows for intellectual analysis of potentials, and then enables RV capabilities to foresee there more exact nature. Example: see the prediction about Margaret Thatcher in the April newsletter, which came to pass almost exactly and within the given time window. These grids are somewhat complicated to construct, but when constructed will enable almost any remote viewer greater access into future potentials.

2. Full-body scanning of internal organs and health status: As a result of working with special equipment designed by a well-known researcher, it became possible to refine my own RV potentials to a degree in which the human body can be seen as transparent. With a knowledge of anatomical and bioenergetics systems, a health status of bio-organs and systems can be described. I have begun working with two MDs and a well-known healer, and the results so far have been extraordinary. I

suspect, but have not yet confirmed, that this can be done remotely, and without the target's knowledge.


3. Assessments of states of consciousness: This one is more difficult to describe, for I fear new words and concepts need to be used -- such as "image-action particles" of consciousness. But a fictional example of this is personified by Counsellor Troy in Star Trek: The Second Generation. She assesses states of consciousness, and can tell when a person is lying, helping, etc., and gives an idea of motives of targeted persons. While many people can sense much of this, the RV ability actually to "see" and dissect image-action particles of the consciousnesses involved enhances this kind of "contact."

4. Am presently developing what I will call "RV-in-betweeners." Here is the realm of thought-forms, which can and do exist independent of bio-organisms. I have isolated some of the principles involved, but here definitely is something so science-fiction-like that I'll postpone describing it -- save to say that I feel certain remote viewers have encountered in-betweeners, and have not understood fully what they were.

As you know, I have always been interested not only in figuring these things out, but erecting a technology for them which can be passed to others. Number 1 above would be difficult in this regard, but 2 and 3 probably could be transferred. Am not sure about 4 yet.

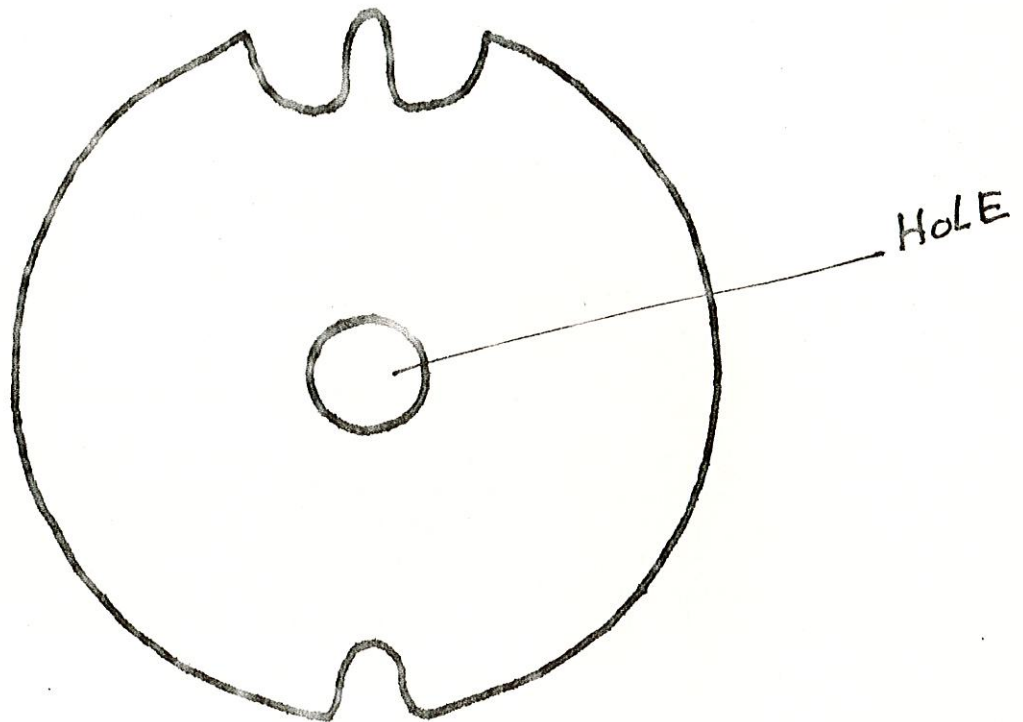

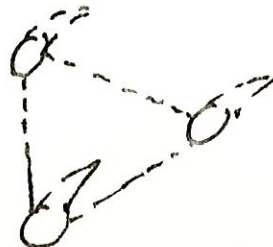

Per your request, here is some additional general information on our company.

*PSI TECH* employs six highly experienced remote viewers. We also utilize Ingo Swann as a subcontractor. Mr. Swann is internationally recognized as this country's premier natural psychic. He discovered and developed the proprietary techniques now used by our company to train and conduct technical remote viewing.

*PSI TECH* has appointed three outside directors from the scientific, industrial, and business communities. Additionally, we have at our disposal an adjunct Technical Analysis Team, consisting of a multidisciplinary group of ten distinguished scientists, engineers, and medical doctors from national labs, major corporations, and universities. These individuals provide analytical support to *PSI TECH* projects, as required.

*PSI TECH* performance standards are exacting; we require military precision on the part of our remote viewers. Each viewer works independently and does not collaborate or compare data with other viewers.

Remote viewing is technically difficult and rigorous. The viewer's concentration is totally focused upon the task of systematically exploring the target, completing the mission, and reporting/recording details using words and sketches, or models, if necessary. Meticulous attention to detail and structure is required to prevent subconscious analysis and/or imagination from interfering with the unconsciously acquired signal.

Briefly outlined below is a description of a *PSI TECH* attack against a sample remote viewing problem, in this case, an airliner crash:

The project is assigned a random set of coordinates. This number is tagged to a very specific task--determine the cause of the accident.

Selected remote viewers would be informed of the nature of the project and provided with specific information, if available, (e.g. tail number of aircraft, or location and approximate time of accident).

The remaining remote viewers would be provided with only the coordinates--no other information. (This not only serves as a control measure, it is the way in which we have been trained to operate. Our experience has shown that there is a penalty to be paid for "front loading" a remote viewer with any of the project details, vs being "kept in the dark" regarding the nature of the task/target: front loading a trained viewer may result in unconscious attention becoming so quickly focused on the gross aspects of the target that the more subtle, possibly important, associated details will sometimes be overlooked. An analog to this appears in experimental psychology, where similar behavior is termed "the restricting effects of awareness").

A remote viewing session is about 45 minutes in duration. In their first sessions, one viewer might acquire the aircraft prior to its crash, another viewer might describe a crash site, and another might immediately provide data relating to the cause of the accident.

Initial reports are screened, (this process is quite technical), for task-related data, and cueing (targeting instructions) developed or refined, based upon each viewer's individual results (data set).

After a number of sessions have been completed, data reduction and analysis are performed, key information and sketches are identified, and an Interim Project Report is provided to the client. If our work indicates, for example, a structural failure just prior to the accident, then the IPR would include such things as sketches of the particular part/assembly that failed and a detailed description of the event.

At this point, the client may desire that we expand upon specific things with greater refinement and detail. This might be the case if, say, *PSI TECH* determined that the cause of the crash had been a bomb. We would then provide amplifying details surrounding the device, its placement aboard the aircraft, the person(s) responsible, etc.

When the client's demands have been met, we prepare a Final Report summarizing all of the project data.

*The Crisis Profile of Saddam Hussein:*

Our customer, a large company with strategic oil interests in the Mid East, was concerned about a potential conflict's effect upon the near and far term price of oil. The statement of work directed *PSI TECH* to provide data and analysis on Saddam himself, i.e., his mind (intent, motivation, emotional and behavioural states), to penetrate his war room (for information concerning battle plans, operations, force strengths, and possible deception schemes), and to provide a six-month (September 90-March 91) general outlook for the Gulf Region.

*Investigative Report: Hydrogen-Based Automobile Power Plant RDT&E:*

The *PSI TECH* client for this project was a major auto company. Our remote viewers performed a world-wide search for present key research and applied engineering work related to hydrogen-powered automobiles. We located and described engineering projects in North America, Japan, France, China, Germany and the USSR. Our final report placed emphasis upon the most potentially successful of the projects, and included detailed sketches of prototype designs, including engines, turbines, flywheels, hydraulic and electric components, etc. (Interestingly, we determined that the most potentially successful design would not belong to our customer!).

*Projected Key Technologies for Lunar In-Situ Resource Processing:*

Our customer was a very large engineering company. Their R&D section wanted help in selecting--or creating--the most economical technologies with which to extract lunar elements (primarily oxygen) for intended use as a possible lunar base energy source, and as a source of propulsion for Moon-Mars expeditions. *PSI TECH* furnished the company descriptions/sketches of actual future lunar mining and resource processing operations, and recommendations with regard to power generation devices.



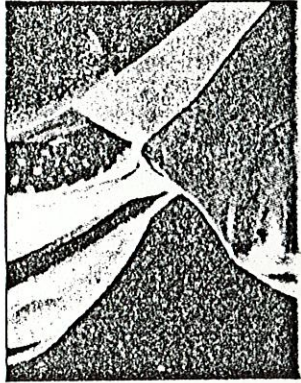

# U.N. enlists psychic firm to find Iraqis' weapon sites

A United Nations team is turning to extrasensory powers to help it find Saddam Hussein's hidden weapon sites.

In the satchel she took to Baghdad, U.S. Army Maj. Karen Jansen carried sketches of two sites where the Iraqi leader has supposedly stashed biological weapons, said Edward Dames, president of a company called PSI Tech.

Mr. Dames, a retired military intelligence major, and an associate drew the sketches through "remote viewing" — the ability to locate and accurately describe unknown things and events from afar.

Various techniques of psychic or extrasensory viewing, which has supporters in academic circles, have been researched in secret by military intelligence since the 1950s. But efforts to develop and implement them have generally met with ridicule or skepticism.

On occasion, they have been used in concert with other intelligence-gathering tools such as satellite photos and electronic-signals monitoring, current and former officials say.

The U.N. commission has found research facilities for germ warfare but no evidence of actual weapons thus far, said Derek Boothby, a commission official in New York. He said he hadn't heard about the Dames sketches. "We welcome all information, if it is practical and can be substantiated," he said.

Ms. Volz said the number of partygoers ranged from 100 expected at the home of a Florida political activist and presidential fund-raising veteran to a handful expected to show up at the homes of political novices in places like Ruppert. The take was expected to range from \$100 to \$500 per party, she said.

Visitors to his office reportedly saw a spoon dancing from the ceiling.

Mr. Dames said he didn't find any weapons of mass destruction in Kuwait.

## Breakthrough in Beirut: Sutherland, Waite freed

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Shiite Muslim kidnappers Monday freed American Thomas Sutherland and Briton Terry Waite, two key Western captives whose release represents a dramatic advance in ending the long hostage ordeal.

The release of the men was confirmed in Beirut by Lebanon's foreign minister, Fares Bweiz, and in New York by Nadia Younes, a spokeswoman for U.N. Secretary-General Javier Pérez de Cuellar.

The U.N. chief said the kidnappers had offered to free all hostages by Christmas.

"That is what I have been offered by the groups, as well as by the Iranian government, which has always given me very strong support, as well as the Syrian government," the U.N. chief said.

Younes said Waite and Sutherland were en route to Damascus, the Syrian capital and traditional transit point for freed hostages.

The State Department hostage repatriation team arrived at Rhein-Main AB, Germany, from Washington around 12:15 p.m. Monday, said an official in Frank-

furt. (Freed American hostages are usually then sent to Wiesbaden, Germany, where they are examined at the military hospital.)

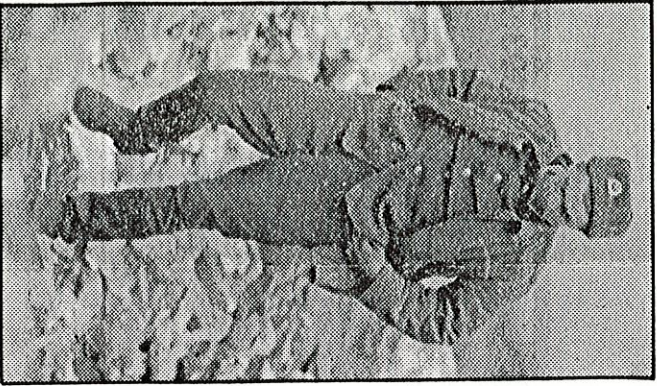

Iranian-allied Islamic Jihad, the most prominent of the groups holding hostages, leaves itself with only one captive — Anderson.

Six longtime hostages — three Americans and three Britons — have been freed since August. A Frenchman held for three days also was released. At least three American captives, two Germans and an Italian remain in the hands of Lebanese kidnappers.

Israel and its allied Lebanese militia have freed 66 Arabs, and the Israelis have received firm word on the death of

two missing soldiers, as well as the body of a third.

Bweiz, the Lebanese foreign minister, said in a statement broadcast by Beirut radio stations that "the release has taken place and I want to extend my congratulations to the Waite and Sutherland families and urge the families of the rest of the hostages to be patient. Their ordeal is approaching an early end."

Pérez de Cuellar's spokeswoman said the U.N.'s special hostage negotiator, Giandomenico Picco, reported the release of Sutherland and Waite.

British Prime Minister John Major reacted cautiously to word of Waite's release, saying Waite had not yet been turned over to British officials.

Waite was special envoy for the arch-

bishop of Canterbury when he disappeared in Beirut on Jan. 20, 1987.

Sutherland, dean of agriculture at the American University in Beirut, was kidnapped June 9, 1985, when gunmen attacked his car as he drove in a convoy from Beirut's airport. The Scottish-born Sutherland, a naturalized American citizen, lived in Estes Park, Colo.

Journalist Steven Emerson, author of a book about the Reagan administration's covert operations, said visitors to Stubblebine's office saw a spoon dangling from the ceiling.

Dames said he, too, faced skepticism both during and after his military service for his attempts to train in "remote viewing."

Two days before the allies marched into Kuwait city last March, a senior administration official asked PSI Tech to scope out the city in case the Iraqis had booby-trapped it with biological weapons, Dames said.

"They were desperate. We're used to people coming to us as a last resort," he said, declining to identify the official who contacted him but describing him as "very high up."

A Pentagon spokesman said he hadn't heard of such a case.
